Family Life:

Audrey was born to Millie Coultis and Herman Bowerman in June of 1918, at Tehkummah, Ontario.

He grew up on Manitoulin Island and Tobermory. Audrey attended South school at Baymouth on Manitoulin Island.

February 1942, Audrey In married Noriene Hazel Hopkins and they had four children, Kyle, Danny, John and Mark.

Audrey worked as first Mate on the Cariboo Ferry Service on Manitoulin Island from 1941 to 1942, before he enlisted with the Royal Canadian Naval Reserve Service as Able Seaman.

He was the Lighthouse Keeper at Flower Pot Island for thirtytwo years from 1950 until 1982 when retired. he was to Unfortunately, just two months from his retirement, **Audrey** would suffer a heart attack and die.

Military Service:

Able Seaman Coultis enlisted at the Sudbury Recruiting Office in February 1942. He trained in Columbia, Toronto, British Quebec and Nova Scotia.

Able Seaman **Coultis** assigned to HMCS Prince Robert and Thetford Mines as a Radar Operator. He was part of Escort group, 25L, of the Atlantic Coast Command, **Operations, North West Atlantic** based in Halifax, Nova Scotia. They escorted ships in Canadian with **Frigates** waters Ste. Therese, Joliette, La Hulloise and Orkney.

In March of 1945, as part of Escort group 25L, HMCS Thetford Mines, HMCS La Hulloise and HMCS Strathadam sunk U-boat 1302 in the Irish The U-boat was a VIIC Sea. type and all hands aboard were lost. Later that month Escort group 26L including the Frigate New Glasglow rammed U-boat 1003 in the Irish Sea. Frigates Thetford Mines and Strathadam would later pick up survivors. On September 18, 1945, Audrey discharged was due demobilization.

Lessons Learned:

Audrey always said, "Never give up!"
